Contracto Causes an Investigation.

The expose of Street Superintendent s violation of the law prohibiting the letting of contracts for public without competition, published exclusively in the "Chronicle," has not only prevented the payment of the \$2500 worth of bills illegally contracted by Ambrose, but has evidently aroused Mayor Phelan to the necessity of being more careful in his official acts and to disapprove bills which he knows have been improperly created.

The Mayor has commenced this work f reform by vetoing a number of printing bills for supplies furnished without olds or competition of any kind. This is followed up with another veto of a resolution passed by the Board of Supervisors authorizing the Street Superintendent to enter into a private contract for doing certain street work in front of a school lot. The Mayor promises to continue his

investigation and the bills of every department in excess of \$100 in amount that are for goods purchased without bids or competition he will reject. This means that the supplies for the city will be purchased cheaper hereafter, business going to the lowest bidder and not to favored friends of the various committees of the Board of Super-

This is clearly a bill for printing. I also hold that all requisitions for books, blanks and stationery must be considered as minting within the meaning of the law. The only authority the Board has for or-dering such work is contained in section 9 of an act of the Legislature approved May 17, 1861, and section 69 of the consolidation act. 
