

CHALLENGING THE GRAND JURY.—In the cases of Ada Mordaunt, indicted for arson, and Alfred Moulin, for libel, both parties moved the County Court to challenge the Grand Jury. In the Mordaunt case, Judge McKinstry decided last evening that both the people and defendant could summon witnesses to show cause why the motion should be denied or allowed. The defendant's counsel then asked for a subpœna requiring the attendance of the Grand Jurors individually as witnesses, and the matter will be heard this morning at ten o'clock. In the case of Moulin, the defendant presented a petition for the privilege of challenging the jurors who indicted him, claiming that he submitted to them certain documents containing charges and offered to substantiate their contents by proof, but the District Attorney and jury declined to receive them and indicted him for libel in submitting the documents for their consideration. He insists that his proposition was a privileged communication which should have been kept secret by the Grand Jury, and after having been used should have been deposited with the Clerk of the Court. Judge McKinstry overruled his motion, and he will be arraigned to plead to-day. The Court offered 500 BUSINESS AND DRESS BEAVER to listen to an argument of the case, provided was presented by a lawyer, but Moulin refused to have counsel.

MINERS' HOMESTEAD ASSOCIATION .- The articles of incorporation of the Miners' Homestead Association were filed in the Clerk's office yesterday. The object of the Association is to purchase a certain tract of land, pay off indebtedness against the same, divide said land into building lots and divide the same among shareholders. The land to be purchased is known as blocks 856, 857, 868, 869 and 949, and the easterly half of blocks 855 and 870, as the same are designated on the official map of outside lands of the city of San Francisco. The capital stock of the company is \$74,500, chief place of business San Francisco, and term of duration two years. James D. Farwell, Thomas H. Kobb, W. Winter, Henry A. Charles and Edward Hall are designated as the Trustees of the company for the first three months. Injunction Suit.—An injunction suit was

Draper is a native of Ohio, aged twenty-one years, single, is recently from Oregon, and is supposed to be a sailor. His symptoms are that he talks incessantly claims to be St. Peter; ran away from his vessel from a fear that he would be thrown overboard; is afraid to go about town, from a fear that he will be killed; is very quiet, laughs all the time and will not lie down to sleep.

A SERIORS ERROR.—A person went into the Bank of California on Wednesday and deposited \$500 in gold, for which he desired a certificate of deposit. The clerk, in the hurry of the moment or from absence of mind, gave him a certificate for \$5,000. The additional "naught did not cost the clerk a great effort but made a material difference to the bank. The party receiving the certificate departed without calling attention to the trifling error. If he disposes of the certificate he will be liable to conviction for grand larceny.

DRAMATISCHER VEREIN EINTRACHT .- The articles of incorporation of a German association with the above name were filed in the Clerk's office yesterday. The objects of the association are, first, to cultivate the dramatic art; and second, to promote social amusement. The term of duration of the society is ten years. The officers named to serve one year are: Edwin Hevelke, President; Carl Shaffer, Vice President; — de la Chaux, Treasurer; — La Roche, Secretary; and George Reinake, B. Bernstein and Heinrich Gille, Trustees.

LABOR EXCHANGE.—The engagements at the Labor Exchange yesterday were sixty-five men and seven women. Of the men, 43 were laborers; 9 carpenters; 5 farm hands; 2 grooms and 6 of various occupations, The females were general servants for the country. The supply of labor is so short that an order for 25 men for Sacramento, at \$45 to \$50 per month and a free passage there, was filled with difficulty. A large order has been received at the above rate, with board. The female department has been placed in charge of Mrs. Bidleman.

SUIT FOR DAMAGES .- James Cassidy commenced suit yesterday in the Fifteenth District Court against W. D. Fleming, Thomas Cavanaugh and Harvey G. White. The complaint states that on the 19th of August, 1868, defendants assaulted and severely beat plaintiff in this city, and so disabled him that he was for a time unable to attend to business. Plaintiff claims damages to the amount of \$10,000, and \$200 compensation for medical attendance.

BURGLAR.-On Wednesday night a burglar broke into the house of Mrs. Maloney, situated in an alley off Lombard street, near Dupont. but was disturbed in his operations by Mrs. M. who discovered him ransacking her dwelling. ANSWER IN THE LOCKJAW CASE.

Dr. Jordan's Version of the Affair-A New Way of Redeeming a Note.

In the case of John Middleton vs. Lewis J.

Jordan, the answer to the complaint was filed by defendant in the Fourth District Court yesterday. The defendant denies that the note given by plaintiff for \$10,000 was executed or delivered to him without any consideration. He denies that he induced the plaintiff to execute the same by fraudulent means, either in representing that his son's life was in danger, or in claiming that he was the only person possessing the requisite knowledge or skill to save him. He denies that he ever professed to plaintiff that he was a physician of great skill and experience. He only said he believed he could cure the patient. He claims to be a skillful physician and no pretender. He denies that he ever attempted to sell the note given him by plaintiff. Defendant further avers that on the 23d of July last, at the request of plaintiff, he visited his son, S. Middleton, who was at that time suffering from severe and dangerous tetanus. He informed plaintiff that he believed he could cure his son, but that his remedies were exceptional and expensive, that he would require the exclusive care and treatment of the patient, and that his charge would be \$10,000, payable on the condition that he would cure the patient, and not otherwise. He further stated to plaintiff that if he should conclude to employ him on the conditions named, he could call at his office at five o'clock that afternoon. Defendant further avers that at the hour named. plaintiff came to his office, accepted the terms of his proposition, and gave him his promissory note for \$10,000 conditioned as above named. Defendant took charge of the patient, attended thim three days, and cured himplacing him beyond danger. Defendant further avers that on the 28th day of July plaintiff requested defendant to call at his business place and bring the note along for settlement.

Defendant called as requested, when plaintiff shook him cordially by the hand, and said he was prepared to settle the note and requested him to produce it. Defendant handed out the note, when plaintiff pocketed the same, and, refusing to pay the whole or any part thereof, retains it at the present time. Plaintiff then called a third party, who proved to be a Deputy Sheriff, who then and there served a summons, injunction and complaint on defendant.

THE NEW EXPLOSIVE. Interesting Experiments-Its Wonderful Power.

A few days since we made brief mention of new explosive compound which had been discovered and invented in this city. The Hafenegger Powder Company of California, have continued to arrive ever since. It is well the incorporation of which was published yesterday, are the owners of this wonderful invention, and from experiments which have been made, there is scarcely a question but that it will prove a valuable explosive for mining and other purposes. One-eighth of an ounce of the Hafenegger powder was recently placed under a ten-pound cannon ball, which was set upon a piece of cast iron into which a slight indentation had been made to receive the powder, and upon being lighted with a fuse, blew the ball some fifteen feet into the air. Seven ounces manner, and its explosion simply rolled the ball a few inches from the position in which it had been placed. A DISHONEST CLERK.

He Appropriates the Money of His Employer and Benefactor.

HE CONFESSES THE DEBT.

Among the numerous patients of Dr. H. H. Toland some two years since was Peter A. Hansen, a young man who had then recently arrived from the East. Hansen was smart and intelligent, and being out of employment Dr. Toland, from motives of benevolence, took him into his employ; and in the course of some months, so well did Hansen attend to his duties, that he was given full charge of his employer's business, which he appeared to manage with great tact and energy. So complete and full was the confidence reposed in him, that his employer seldom questioned him concerning his affairs, and he conducted matters pretty much his own way. He got married about a year since, and altogether appeared to be an industrious, steady and thrifty young man. A short time since the Doctor noticed that his receipts were saddly falling off, and that, instead of being easy in financial affairs, he was more straightened than the prosperity of his business would naturally warrant. He asked Hansen the reason, when the latter replied that the Doctor's family expenses had been increasing of late, which accounted for the money drain. But a further probing of the affair did not tend to substantiate this theory and finally after several days of "backing and filling" Hansen, upon the demand of his employer, furnished what purported to be a balancesheet of the Doctor's accounts, in which he showed himself to be "indebted" to the Doctor to the amount of some \$1,500. He confessed that he had appropriated this money, and proposed to refund it when he was able. Dr. Toland then requested Hansen to give up his (the Doctor's) books; but two books, in which were recorded the business of the office from day to day and which contained a list of the Doctor's patients, were missing. Hansen denied all knowledge of them, and up to this time they have not been forthcoming. When matters had assumed this aspect, Dr. Toland entered a complaint against Hansen for embezdement, upon which he was examined in the Police Court and held to answer, with bail fixed at \$3,000. He was unable to procure the necessary bond and was lodged in jail, where he HIS MODE OF OPERATING.

had extended over a considerable period of time, and there are good reasons for believing that nearly the entire receipts of the office from the country found their way into his pockets. WRECK OF THE BARK BRIGNARDELLO.

ALL HANDS SAVED. The Vessel Likely to Prove a Total

Loss

About half past one o'clock yesterday morns-

ing the telegraph flashed the intelligence to the

Merchants' Exchange that the bark Brignardello, fifty-five days from Valparaiso, had gone ashore about half a mile south of the Cliff House, or half way between the Cliff House and Ocean Beach House. No further particulars of the disaster were known in town until yesterday morning, when a great many people visited the ocean beach to see the stranded vessel. The Captain attributes the disaster to his chronometer, which he says was out of order, and he supposed that he was some forty miles at sea until the vessel struck. Up to about noon yesterday she laid easy, thumping but little, but in the afternoon the breeze freshened and the waves increased in size, causing her to labor considerably. During the morning the crew got ashore, and saved their dunnage. Toward night the wind moderated, and slings were rigged from the jibboom to the shore, upon which the top cargo of the vessel was discharged up to a late hour ast evening. She was then imbedded three or four feet in the sand, heading directly on shore, with the waves beating squarely against her stern. At an early hour yesterday morning the ng Rescue went to the scene, but owing to her leep draft was unable to render any assistance. As we go to press this morning, the tug Rescue is at work endeavoring to pull the bark into deep water, but it is regarded by nautical men as an extremely difficult if not an impossible task. The position in which she lies is regarded as extremely favorable, but the tides,

THE STRANDED BARK. The bark Brignardello was built in Genos, Italy, some two years since, for the firm of Brignardello Brothers, one of whom is a member of the firm of Brignardello & Machiavello of this city. She was at this port some fifteen months since, this being her second trip from Valparaiso. She registered 569 tons and contains a European cargo, consisting of 200 tens of marble, 2,500 boxes of oil, 3,000 sacks of almonds, 30 boxes of cheese, 60 bales of paper, 100 sacks of wheat, 40 sacks of chicory, 400 boxes of brick, 50 cases of vermouth, and 4 cases of blacking. The ship is insured in Genos, but for what amount we have not been able to ascertain. The almonds are insured in the Union Insurance Company of this city, for \$7,000. Probably other portions of her cargo are covered by insurance. The Captain states that he was standing in shore for a pilot when the disaster occurred. It was reported on Change yesterday, with how much truth we do not know, that six of the San Francisco pilots were seen at the Fair on the previous evening.
