

Radium, discovered in 1898, was valued at \$5,000,000 a pound. Its estimated value has since been reduced to \$2,721,555.90 a pound, which is a very material reduction, but the price is still high. We read with interest that a Buffalo man, Stephen T. Lockwood. expacts to engage in the manufacture, or extraction, of this interesting substance, and hopes to lower the price still further. His hopes, as recorded in the papers, are based on the possession of certain deposits of carnotite in Utah, from which he has been ableto extract radium, and which he believes can be induced to give its radium up somewhat easier than the pitchblende from which the radium so far obtained has been extracted.
