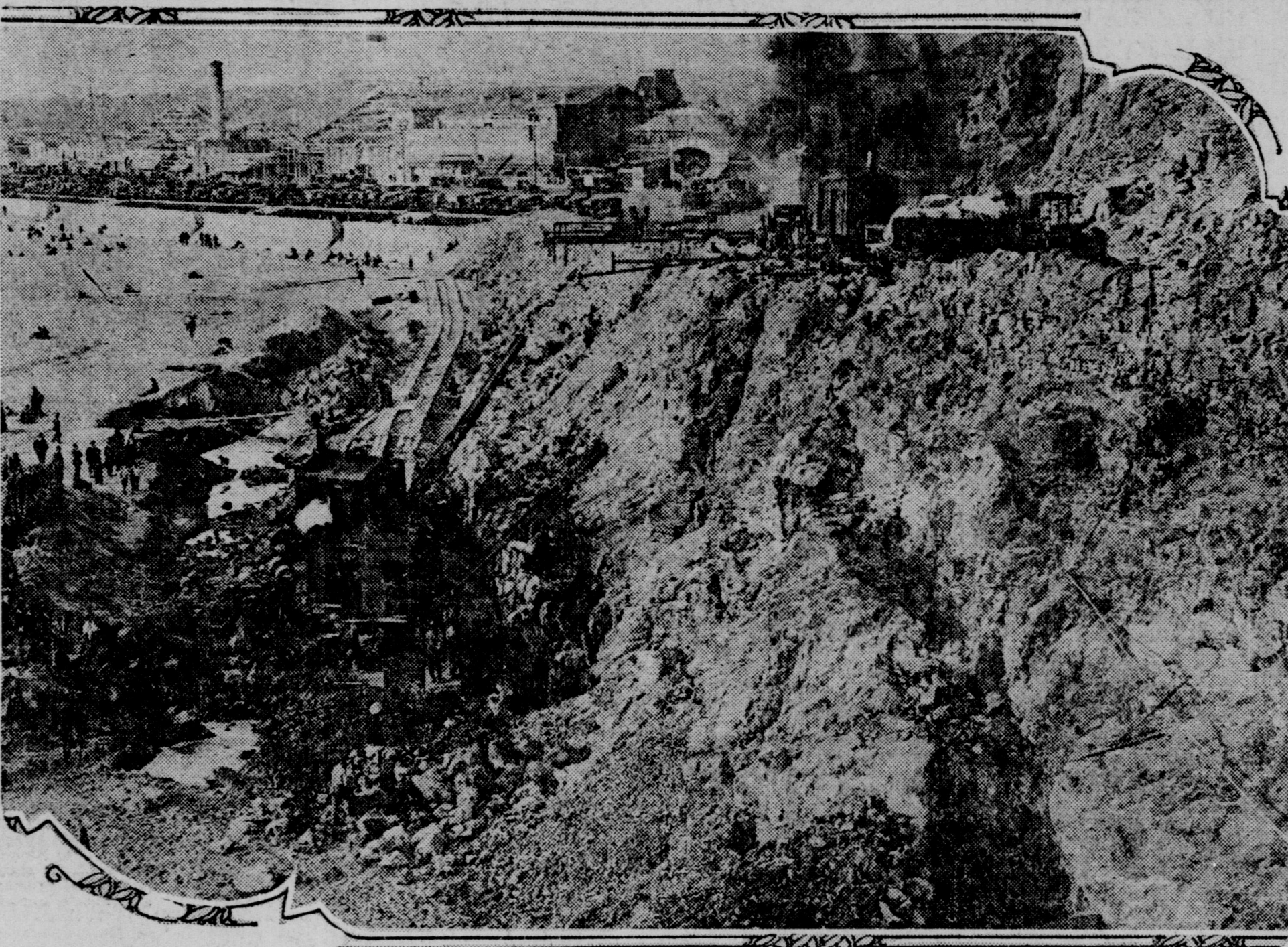

### STARWAY TO BE BUILT FROM AVENUE UP HIGH CLIFF

### NEW VIEW FROM CLIFF HOUSE! IT'LL LOOK BETTER WHEN JOB ENDS

No, they're not shoveling Sutro Heights into the ocean! The Call cameraman's photo, snapped today, shows excavation below the Cliff House for the wide boulevard to wind around Sutro Heights between Forty-eighth avenue and the Great Highway. A giant rubble wall is to be built up from the beach to support the new highway.



Sunday visitors at the beach in the vicinity of the Cliff House were amazed yesterday at the progress being made in the construction of Point Lobos avenue around Sutro Heights between Forty-eighth avenue and the Great Highway. The work will cost \$150,000.

The workmen are now engaged in cutting the avenue around Sutro Heights, preparatory to the paving work, and in the construction of a rubble wall below the road to prevent the wearing away of the embankment by the ocean.

The cutting down of the grade around Sutro Heights is heavy work, and is being done by J. H. Holland & Co., under a sub-contract from Eaton & Smith, the general contractors.

### SIDEWALK PLANNED

The new grade curves around the hill and the avenue will have a width of 60 feet, of which 20 feet on the outer, or ocean side, will be sidewalk for pedestrians.

The center of the driveway will be paved with vitrified brick to give traction to cars in wet weather, and on either side of the brick will be asphalt pavement set on concrete foundation.

The entire avenue will be lighted with ornamental lights as far as the esplanade on the beach.

### ORNAMENTAL STAIR

Later, under the supervision of John J. McLaren, park superintendent, an ornamental stairway will be built from the avenue up the cliff to Sutro Heights, and when completed the construction work will make of this place a beauty spot unequalled anywhere.

Another piece of improvement now under way at the beach is a new section of the esplanade, which is advancing the concrete pouring stage. A cartload of cement will be required daily while the work is being finished. The city is spending \$150,000 on this section of the esplanade.

### SCHOOL HEAD'S ARREST ASKED ON CHARGE OF STRIKING BOY

Cavil Hitchcock, director of the Hitchcock Patrol of Oakland, applied today to Daniel Rygal, deputy district attorney of Oakland, for a warrant for the arrest on a charge of battery of C. E. Hudspeth, principal of the Washington school of that city.

The warrant was denied pending a hearing to be given in the juvenile court on November 18 on the battery charge preferred by the principal against Hitchcock's 14-year-old son, George, who is accused by the teacher with having broken his nose with a blow at the school last week.
