Water for irrigating the fruit belt is supplied mainly by the Bear River Canal system, which, with its branches and projected lines now being constructed, is the largest single system in Central California. The dam, or primary reservoir, from which the water is taken, is on Bear river, about two miles above Colfax. Thence the water is taken by the main canal, running southerly to the foothills below, and distributed by various branches and ofishoots wherever required. The system, including the Little Bear river canal, which takes water from Bear river about filteen miles below the main dam, comprises an aggregate length of nearly 300 miles.
