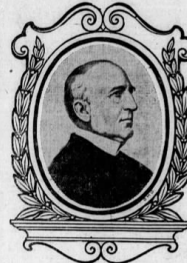

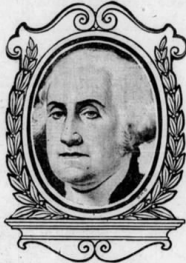

RESOLVED, That in the judgment of this House the precedent established by Washington and other Presidents of the United States in retiring from the Presidential office after their second term, has become by universal concurrence a part of our republican system of government, and that any departure from this time-honored custom would be unwise, unpatriotic, and fraught with peril to our free institutions—Resolution offered in the House of Representatives in Congress on December 15, 1876, by Springer of Illinois, and adopted by 233 yeas to 18 nays, 38 not voting.

Examination is to be made today to determine whether any ill effects yet remain from the Yel Felon.

Dr. Rixey in His Latest Bulletin Says He is Unable to Note Any Improvement in His Patient's Condition.

Medical Profession Takes Cognizance of the Remarkable Vitally Shown by the Mistress of the White House.

It is said that there has been no perceptible improvement whatever in Mrs. McKinley's condition during the day—nothing more, by Dr. Rixey's report, Washington, D. C., June 6.

It is reported, however, that the result of the examination will not be known until about noon tomorrow. It is not to be stated on authority of the White House, which is the only source of information in the city.

The medical profession has taken cognizance of the remarkable vitality shown by the mistress of the White House.

Dr. Rixey notified today in comment on the new and extremely interesting phase of the case, holding that it was a matter of great interest.

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Men of Each Political Party See the Question From Different View Points.

SENATOR DEPEW'S proposition that President McKinley be elected for a third term has been brought to the attention of statesmen and politicians of the nation, the State and the city. The views of many of them follow:

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Senator Morgan of Alabama—A man who is as honest as a Roman figure appears to be under the kindly protection of the President and his cabinet, and it is not surprising that he is willing to be his adviser in all matters, no matter what result follows from the President's action.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Governor T. G. Green—I do not believe that McKinley will be the first President to have a third term, but that the one to have will be McKinley.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Governor P. S. Vaughan—It is in my opinion as a citizen and as a politician that the President's proposal is a question of the highest importance.

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
