

### Oceanic Company Suffers Loss From Slow Work of Cramps. Many Magnates Perplexed Over the Future of Salt Lake's Line.

Yesterday the stock of the Oceanic Steamship Company declined several points. The cause of the depression was an assessment of \$100,000 per share levied in order to provide means for meeting interest obligations on the bonds of the corporation.

By the failure of the Cramps of Philadelphia to complete, according to agreement, the new steamer, the *Sierra*, the Oceanic Steamship Company was forced to incur heavy expense in the employment of other vessels to maintain its obligations to the public pursuant to contract schedule. The company was also deprived of the earnings of the three new ships for a period exceeding eight months.


It is claimed that the Cramps and Sons, in completing the ships was caused by labor strikes, the pressure of work undertaken for the Electric Light and Power Company, and the fact that the men employed at the yards could not work.

The delays, whether justifiable or not, deprived the Oceanic Company of the use of the new ships at a time when they could have been used to the profit and advantage of the company.
