He presented the plan in the form of a resolution. which at his own suggestion, was taken under advisement by the Board, in order that Mayor Phelan, who was named as one of the trustees to the bequest, and the administrator of the estate may be suited, and their approval obtained. The resolution says in substance that Elias Hochstadter, who-died some years **ngo, bequea**thed \$1000 in trust to the Board of Education of this city to be expended in stimulating to improvement in their studies the colored children attending the public schools of San

Nothing has heretofore been done to execute that trust. The fund now amounts to \$1500, and the Board of Education will apply the bequest according to the wishes of the testator. The plan suggests that public notice be given that colored pupils of the public schools residing in this city, who desire to secure this educational benefit, make apcure this educational benefit, make ap-plication addressed to the Superintend-ent of Schools on or before November 15, 1901. The applicants must be at beast fourteen years of age and must possess a certificate of good character. From all the applicants four of the high-est rank will be selected through a com-petitive examination conducted by the superintendent and his deputies. The superintendent and his deputies. The scope of examination will include arith-metic, spelling, reading and penman-ship. Each successful applicant will be allowed traveling expenses to the in-stitution selected, and \$100 will be deposited with the president or principal of the selected institution, in advance, each year, for a term not exceeding four ars, or until the fund is exhausted, to years, or until the fully is calmanded, in be applied to the maintenance and tuition of the student.
