Judge Hoffman intimated that such an argument was a waste of time, because the Supreme Court having passed upon the question, and held that a Bankruptcy Court had jurisdiction of such matters, it would be presumptuous for him to attempt to overrule that decision, even if Mr. Felton succeeded in convincing him.
