"Faust," which has been the stumbling block in the way of many an
Italian opera company playing at
popular prices in this city, proved
last night to be quite consonant with
the Bovani singers at the Aleazar. I
have heard mumy Italian tenors fail
at the beatific tip of the translated
"Sulve dimora, custo pura," and for
once in their spectacular lives leave
out the high C. Likewise. I have
heard podgy Slobels sing the role of
the protector of Marguerita with as
much reeling as is attributed to anomolous slaves in a harem; the devil
has turned polite and the brother,
Valentine, has merely sung bartone.
All this and more has happened when
Italian opera companies have invaded
France to sing its masterpiece of old
fashloned opera.

The ear was kept delightfully busy. Miss Kristoffy wang in her best voice and appealed in her best role. As Marguerite she exhibited a side of her artistry closely akin, I think, to her own personality—a personality of grace, beauty and ingenuous charm. Her "low! Song" should have been encored, and would have been had not the inffexible Zuro waved his baton vigorously and triumphantly onward into the Gunda score.

What the opera lacked will often be missed by a Gounod lovdt. There are delicate, hidden beauties in the score which can only be found and reproduced by the most delicate care. I am thinking, for instance, of Valentine's brief recitative, where he cominends Marguerite to Siebel's care, or of Faust's brief phrase in the garden scene where he sings "of peace and love and innocene untold."
