"That the car left the track at. Walridge and Schwerin streets because of the excessive speed at which it approached the curve, and the deaths were due to the carelessness of the motorman. The car was operated by one man, acting as motorman-conductor. We recommend that all cars be operated by two men, a motorman and a conductor."

Testerday's inquest concerned the deaths of Herbert Perasso, Englebert J. Baecher and Robert M. Elchardson who died in San Francisco county. The other victims died in San Mateo county, and an inquiry into their deaths was held in Daly City last week.
