The Goat Island Fight. In the fight now going on before the Senate Committee on Military Affairs in reference to granting Goat Island to the Central Pacific Railroad, the State is fortunate in being represented by Mr. McRuer, an intelligent gentleman from San Francisco, who is thoroughly posted in the entire history of this claim. and whose reputation is a guarantee that it will be faithfully represented to Senators. The letter of your correspondent reporting his interview with a noted lawyer of Siskiyon county is correct in its details of the treatment of these Indians and of the just endeavors of that gentle man to protect them in their rights to their own land. As it stands, the judgment is turned against the Indian agents for starving "Captain Jack" and "his tribe" upon the Reservation. To be sure, the Indian Agents did starve them and made money by charging to the Government beef and clothing that the Indians never received. But the question is, how after such a treaty did thoso Indians ever get placed on the sald Reservation? Why were they forced there after said stipulations on the part of the United States through its authorized agents?

The Indians were foreibly and decelifully taken from the lands thus guaranteed to them and placed upon the said reservation to be systematically robbed, starved and exterminated. But why? Biccause the lands guaranteed to them by this treaty were wanted by the cattle owners; and they and those of like interests were the ones to have the Modocs foreibly removed from their own grounds. sure, the Indian Agents did starve them and
