Sheriff Barnett to-day took into custody James Crowhurst, a clerk at 1192 East Twenty-first street, and is holding him in the County Jail under suspicion of knowing the perpetrators of the assault and robbery. The Sheriff then went to San Francisco, where he had reason to believe that the murderous ruffians had fled. Crowhurst protests that he knows nothing of the affair.
