

## BROOKLYN SHRIMERS CHEERED AT 'FRISCO

Delegates Overwhelmed With the Generous Hospitality Showered Upon Them.

## WOMEN ALSO ENTERTAINED.

Trips Over Hot Sands Not Altogether Parching Jaunts.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13.—Brooklyn Shrimers last night transferred its headquarters from East to West Market street. Under flying banners and gaudy lanterns marched the nobles of Kismet Temple, and at every step they were cheered by multitudes of the faithful who lined the thoroughfare.

The nobles marched to their headquarters at the Palace Hotel, where former residents of New York State, headed by J. Harold Beach, greeted them and told of the special plans for the entertainment of the section of Brooklyn now in San Francisco. Headquarters had arranged automobile tours, dinner and theatre parties, meetings and other diversions from the old home town and the old home State, and so much other diversion that the delegates could not accept all that was offered.

The women who accompanied the party from Brooklyn were not overlooked by their San Francisco hosts as hostesses, and for them there were teas, shopping excursions, trips to Chinatown, the Cliff House, and visits with the women of other delegations.

It is understood that the visitors have already found that the hot journey over the sands to Mecca is not an altogether dry jaunt. Since the Shrimers came to town for some reason or other, the word has been whispered around "The boys are here to play, San Francisco knows how, let's show them." The Kismet nobles and their ladies have discovered one fact about San Francisco. It is a fast town, particularly automobile traffic. Taxicabs travel at twenty-five and thirty miles an hour. Everything goes provided no one is injured.

Colan C. MacGibbon, member of New York State Shrimers' Reception committee, was here to extend a welcome to the 184 other members of the committee when they arrived to-night. And better still, he was on hand to collect a wager of \$250, made less than a month ago with members of Kismet Temple, that he could work his way to the Imperial Hotel and back to San Francisco ahead of any other member of his temple. MacGibbon travelled most of the way in the hot engine room of a steamer which sailed from New York to San Pedro through the Panama Canal.

"After regulating oil burners below decks in the canal zone," he said, "I know that there will be no burning sands here hot enough to blister my feet."

The traveler cooled off a bit on the last leg of his journey, made on the breezy deck of a freight train from Los Angeles to San Francisco. MacGibbon arrived at the ferry building—early yesterday, wearing Highland kilts.

To-day the formal parades, the elaborate receptions to the Imperial Divan, and the business sessions of the Imperial Council begin.

The civic auditorium presented a timely lighted, mystic interior yesterday for bands, orchestras and groups of chanters. Well-trained choruses chanted familiar songs before a crowd of several thousand, and last night the auditorium was the scene of a vocal concert by Shrine organizations from all parts of the United States and Canada.

The Imperial party was entertained at dinner last night by Ira W. Coburn, potentate of Islam Temple, of San Francisco, and his fellow officers.
