A BRAND-NEW VOLCANO.

It Is Discovered Near Kodiak - Tidal-House Swept Away. According to a letter received by Pro-

lessor Davidson of the Coast and Geodetic Survey from the Coast Survey Tidal Survey at St. Paul, Kodiak Island, under date of February 24th, the tidal-house was swept away on the 11th of the same month during a heavy northwest gale. It was, however, recovered from the north end of Bliskey Island. The wharf of the Alaska Comnercial Company, on which the house tands, was also washed away and consid erably injured.
