Fees Collected to be Used for Road Repairs

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 7. official registration of motor vehicles for 1925 by counties, upon which apportionment of fees to the road funds of the various counties

which apportionment of fees to the road funds of the various counties is based, was announced today by Will II. Marsh, chief of the Division of Motor Vehicles. It shows a grand total of 1,561,944 Vehicles registered for the period February 1, 1925, to December 31, 1925.

Marsh's compilation shows, 50,437 cars from other States were registered during the year. It also includes 22,280 vehicles that were exempt from payment of fees and 12,219 motor-vehicle dealers.

Fee-paid registrations were shown as follows: Automobiles, 1,225,796; solid trucks, 42,325; pneumatic trucks, 172,420; motor-cycles, 11,002; trailers, 25,463.

Substantial gains were shown to have been made by practically all the counties. Los Angeles county was shown to have registered more than one-third of all the vehicles in the State, being credited with 506,267 regular passenger automobiles alone and a total of all vehicles of 588,346. San Francisco is second with a total registration of thirty-six vehicles.

The fees collected by the division are divided equally between the State Highway Commission and the various countles for road-repair purposes. Such allotments are made on the basis of these registrations.

## INOUIRY IN **FOOD POOL** INDICATED

Justice Department Moves to Act Against Phases of Asserted Combine

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 .- Infornation spread in government circles tonight that the Department of Justice was prepared to move quickly against certain phases of mergers. The character of the proceeding remained a carefully guarded secret and no official of the department would discuss it.

Trom Federal Trade Commission sources, it developed that the legal department of the government had requested of it information dealing with the food products question, but whether this concerned specifically the recent organization of the William B. Ward Food Products Corporation or the baking industry in general could not be ascertained. There were strong indications, however, that some action would be taken very promptly.

Only last Thursday the Trade Commission ordered a special investigation into the new Ward corporation to be conducted by its legal department aside from the commission's economic inquiry into the entire baking industry, which has long been in progress at the request of the Senate. It was said at the time that the general investigation would not be completed for several months, but commission officials tonight would not say whether the indicated Federal action involved any recent mergers.

Federal acquisition and operation of the recently formed food products merger is proposed in a resolution drafted by representative Berger, Socialist, Wisconsin, for introduction tomorrow. It would provide a commission to determine the value of the property acquired and to pay the present owners.

With the arrival of the steamer Wabana from Sydney, Nova Scotia, this port received its first direct interconstal shipment of steel in full cargo lots. The plan of shipping is to send steel west and take lumber back to the east coast of Canada, thus giving the vessel two-way cargoes and reducing the freight rates on both steel and lumber.

A plan to establish a transshipping station here for the Orient is also under way, as the steel will come here from Eastern Canada and will be forwarded to the Orient. Nova Scotia has had difficulty in getting a foreign market for its steel products, until this combination interconstal and trans-Pacific channel opened up.

# RADIO BENEFIT

Direction Signals Obtained in Mid-ocean

Intennae Swings in Line With Sending Station

Correct Time Also Sent Out

From San Francisco

IBY A. P. NIGHT WIRE! SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 7.-Ra dio, which has dissipated the pall of loneliness that once overhung ships on the isolated parts of the high seas, also is effecting a marked change in navigation

marked change in navigation methods.

More than half of the larger boats visiting Pacific Coast ports are now getting direction signals over the ether wave and as a result the older, more cumbersome ways of figuring distances, longitude and latitude are fading.

The information that goes to the captain in his chart room through the "direction finder" enables him to determine his exact position at sea, without reference to the ship's speed or detailed log. A "loop," which is the antennae, is operated on hearings like a weather vane at the top of its shaft. When this is swing into a position that gives the maximum intensity of sound, determined by ear, it is pointing directly at the signalling shore station. It then is swung at right angles so that no signal whatever is received.

In this position dials and hands operating over a Sparry-gyro compass record the direction of the ship, eliminating the necessity of figuring variation because of magnetic attraction, as must be done with a compass.

Another advance in navigation creditable to radio is the manner of giving ships at sea, the correct time. In the old days the captain set his chronometers when in port or effshore where he was within range of a flashing light signal, the dropping of a metal ball or the whine of a siren. These adjuncts are still employed, but the navigator need not depend on them. For he can get his time at stated intervals no matter in what part of the world his ship may be.

Those on the Pacific—from Alaska to Korea—are given a time signal every day at 10 p.m. San Francisco time. It has been caught from points as distant as London.

The time given to the navigator is "accurate to one part in 170,000," which in lay terms means that it is not in error more than a half-second, To the average man a "second" means little; to the Mare Island Naval Observatory it is 1-86,400th part of a day. Time is measured much more minutely than by "seconds," however.

### NOAH'S ARK OF EARLY DAY FOUND

Alabaster Plaque Shows Boat With Animals and Man on Board

LONDON, Feb. 7.—An account of what is described as "the earliest representation of Noah's Ark" is contained in a report by the British Museum of discoveries at Ur of the Chaldees, Mespotamia. The report is from Leonard Woolley, leader of excavations conducted by the museum in co-operation with the University of Pennsylvania.
"We traced the inner face of the great wall built by King Nebu-

great wall built by King Nebi-chadnezzar around the old build-ings of the Sacred Area of Ur and found its southwest gate," he says, "Then we laid bare some houses, which seem to have been last in-habited about 693 B.C. Near-by habited about 693 B.C. Near-by there was a little plaque of alubaster, carved on both sides, the scenes represented being a boat of reeds tied together. On the stern is a man, while in the cabin is a pig. On the other side the pig's place is taken by a goose, and two fish hang by a string. We called it Noah's Ark, and, as the earliest representation of Noah's Ark, it will take its place among the treasures of Ur."


